Homelessness is a growing crisis in Brown County. The Brown County Homeless and Housing Coalition is a community partnership working toward ending homelessness and housing insecurity.

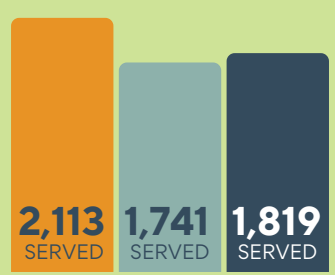
How we measure success

We will prevent homelessness from occurring whenever possible, and when we can't prevent it, we will work to ensure the experience of homelessness is **RARE, BRIEF, and NON-RECURRING**.

IS IT RARE?

In Brown County, the total number of people served by homeless services has come **DOWN** from its peak in 2021.

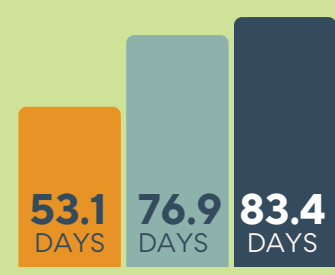

IS IT BRIEF?

The average length of time that people experience homelessness here has **INCREASED** by 30 days since 2021.

IS IT NON-RECURRING?

The percentage of people returning to homelessness within 2 years of moving into permanent housing in Brown County is **DECLINING**.

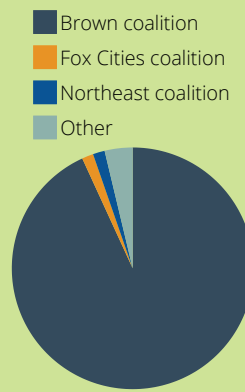


MIGRATION

93% of people served are from our community.

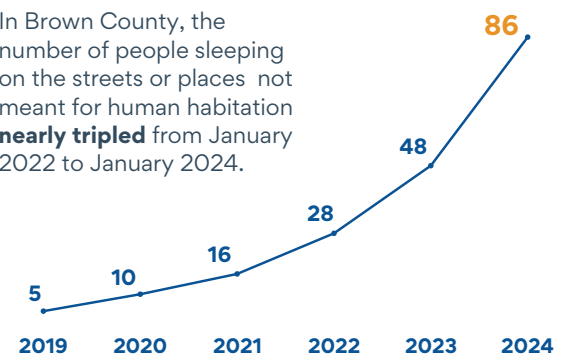
This pie chart shows that the vast majority of people utilizing homeless services in Brown County lived in the community prior to entering service here.

Data is based on each person's last known address.



UNSHeltered HOMELESSNESS IS ON THE RISE

In Brown County, the number of people sleeping on the streets or places not meant for human habitation **nearly tripled** from January 2022 to January 2024.



Who experiences homelessness

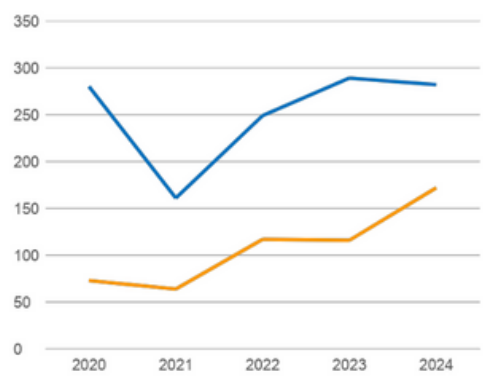
There are multiple ways to look at the data around those experiencing homelessness. Below is a partial summary of who was served in 2023.

3 in 5 experienced homelessness for the first time

Nearly 3 in 4 homeless adults had a disability

1 in 4 was a child under the age of 18

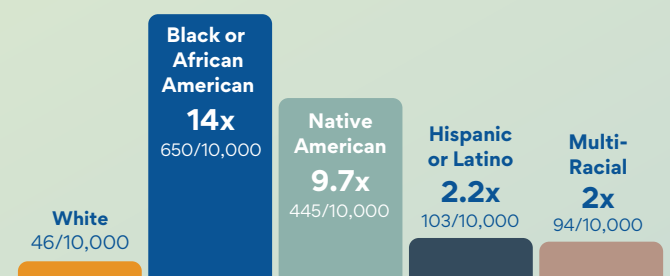
■ **Households without children**

RACIAL DISPARITIES

Homelessness disproportionately impacts people of color.

The chart below compares the rate of homelessness by race and ethnicity, per 10,000. People who identify as Black or African American are **14x more likely** to experience homelessness compared to those who identify as White.
