Applicant	Project	Summary
Greater Green Bay Habitat for Humanity	Homeownership Program	The Homeownership Program provides safe, affordable housing to qualified low-to moderate income individuals and families who cannot qualify for a conventional loan. By using donated materials and volunteer labor, Habitat keeps building costs down, allowing the home to be purchased with an affordable 0% interest mortgage. All funds received from this grant will be used to support the Homeownership Program, including land acquisition, construction materials, and local contractor expenses. This grant will help Habitat achieve their 2026 goal of building 15 new construction homes.
Jackie Nitschke Center	Women's Residential Treatment Center	Funding will support the expansion of Jackie Nitschke Center's co-occurring mental health/substance use treatment center to include a 14-bed female-specific residential treatment program. This would be the only female-specific treatment center in Brown County and one of seven in the state. This project directly aligns with JNC's goal to be responsive to the needs of the community and address the root causes of poverty.
Journey to Adult Success	Residential Program	When young people reach the age of 18 and age out of foster care, many find themselves facing uncertainty about their next steps. Unlike many of their peers, these youth often lack the support systems that others take for granted. This funding will support the operations of Journey to Adult Success as they provide a pathway to self-sufficiency for these youth and others like them.
NeighborWorks	Green Bay Housing Partnership Launch	For 43 years, NeighborWorks has been serving families in Northeast Wisconsin. Last year, they helped 150 families achieve their dream of home ownership, 63% of whom were low-income. Funding will be used to help launch the Green Bay Housing Partnership, a local Community Land Trust (CLT) that will create permanently affordable housing for modest income households. Working families who cannot compete in the conventional market can purchase homes through the CLT's programs and begin building equity and, ultimately, intergenerational wealth. Any homes in the trust, when sold, will be purchased by another qualifying family at a price that is attainable and sustainable. CLTs have been established successfully for decades, with several in Wisconsin, notably in Madison and Door County.

Violence Intervention Project	Restorative Housing Project: Bridging the Gap After FEMA & VOCA Cuts	The Violence Intervention Project seeks funds to prevent homelessness among survivors of violence in rural Kewaunee County. With no local shelter and limited affordable housing, support will provide rental assistance, emergency hotel stays and sustain their Transitional Living Program Coordinator. These resources ensure survivors and their families can remain safe, stable, and connected to their community despite recent funding cuts.
YWCA of Greater Green Bay	Childcare Tuition Subsidies	The high cost of childcare has made it difficult for many parents to access quality care. Without affordable options, many parents are left with no choice but to stay home to care for their children, which limits their ability to work or pursue education. YWCA Greater Green Bay runs a large, state licensed group childcare center. Funding will provide tuition subsidies to make high-quality childcare accessible and affordable for low- and very low-income families. By offering subsidies, they will strengthen retention among current families while also attracting new families who otherwise could not afford care, ensuring more children benefit from their safe, nurturing, state-licensed program.
